

Thoughts on Today's Scriptures 1 Samuel 16:1-13; Psalm 51:10-14

This week we hear another story of Call – that of David as the king of Israel. He is subversively crown (or anointed) by the priest Samuel (called to be a truth-teller in last week's scripture of 1 Samuel 3). Here he is afraid of the current king, Saul. For Samuel is commanded by God to commit treason: to anoint a new king while the old one is still on the throne. He is afraid of the King, Saul, and is divinely directed to Bethlehem: a city outside of the royal reach of Saul's Northern Kingdom. Yet even there the people are afraid too of the political implications of the prophet's arrival (9:4). This story of a new beginning, of God's sovereign power working within the happenings of human history, of the divine import not on the physical appearance but on something else, all of this begins in the tension of fear, anxiety and human trembling.

Saul is out as king for his disobedience and covenant breaking with God. Royal power flows first and foremost from a relationship with the Divine Maker, the Holy One in whose image we all are created. This is proclaimed by the prophet Samuel in 1 Samuel 13:13-14 and 15:26-28. Yet the new king, seems to be the farthest from what one would imagine – even the prophet Samuel. He thinks that the eldest son of Jesse will be the king, Eliab, who like Saul, is big, strong, handsome. Yet God sees beyond the physical, more than the visible. God chooses the youngest, smallest: the family runt – David (who still happens to be strikingly handsome!) The Apostle Paul talks of this paradox in saying , "God chose what is weak in the world to shame the strong; God chose what is low and despised in the world, things that are not, to reduce to nothing things that are, so that no one might boast in the presence of God." 1 Corinthians 1:26-31.

Great philosophers and scientists have also remarked on the ways in which our vision is limited, and often fools us. German philosopher Friedrich Nietzsche, one of the fathers of postmodernism wrote "Sometimes people don't want to hear the truth because they don't want their illusions destroyed." Francis Bacon, father of the modernist scientific method observed, "We prefer to believe what we prefer to be true." John Stuart Mill, the father of Liberalism – our current belief in the primary importance of individual liberty – described our limited vision saying "He who knows only his own side of the case knows little of that."

What does this paradox mean for our own calls, and the ways in which we see (or don't see) what God is up to, observe each other, or even envision ourselves? What does this mean for us in a technological culture consumed with images, being liked and followed by the masses on social media, being "right" in our deepening political polarizations?

Questions for the practice of Examen & Contemplation

- What shimmers for you in this passage?
- What word, phrase or image touches your life today?
- How, when and where have you experienced this mysterious paradox of God's calling – that God often chooses what we wouldn't, seeing more than we can or do?
- Talk with God about how your limited vision might be keeping you from knowing all of the fullness, goodness and peace God wants for you to know.

CALL TO WORSHIP

This morning we're reading various stories of call from the Bible, taken from Genesis 1:26-31; Exodus 3:1-14; Ruth 1:1-16; Matthew 28:18-20. **The community is invited to respond to each phrase in the bold font.** The reader reads the plain font.

Leader: God created them male and female, calling Adam and Eve to reflect the image of God in the world.

People: God blessed them:

"Prosper! Reproduce! Fill Earth! Take charge!

Be responsible for fish in the sea and birds in
the air, for every living thing that moves on
the face of Earth."

Leader: The LORD Adonai called to Moses from the bush which was blazing away but it didn't burn up. I am the God of your father: The God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, the God of Jacob. Remove your sandals from your feet. You're standing on holy ground. I've taken a good, long look at the affliction of my people in Egypt. I've heard their cries for deliverance from their slave masters; I know all about their pain. And now I have come down to help them, pry them loose from the grip of Egypt, get them out of that country and bring them to a good land with wide-open spaces, a land lush with milk and honey.

People: Moses answered, begging "But why me?
What makes you think that I could ever do such
an impossible thing? Don't send. me. They won't
believe me. I stutter. Send someone else.
God said to Moses, "I-AM-WHO-I-AM. Tell the People
of Israel, 'I-AM sent you to them.'"

Leader: In the days when judges led Israel, before
Samuel — there was a famine in the land. Ruth, a
Moabite woman, married to an Israelite saw her
husband, brother-in-law and father-in-law die in the
famine. Her mother-in-law released her from the
marriage covenant, sending her away to find food.
But she demurred, moved by faith, by her call from
God, saying

People: "Don't force me to leave you; don't make me go home. Where you go, I go; and where you live, I'll live. Your people are my people, your God is my god; where you die, I'll die, and that's where I'll be buried, so help me God—not even death itself is going to come between us!"

Leader: We too – rich and poor, young and old, black and white, weak and strong – we are called today, in this time of a new emergence: great change thanks to technology, economic power, a growing population, renewed migration, leading to anxiety-caused polarization, hatred, mistrust and fear.

People: God calls us today, through Jesus to fish for people, going out to train everyone we meet, far and near, in the Jesus way of life, marking them by baptism in the threefold name: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit; instructing them in the practice of all Jesus has taught us for he will be with us as we do this. right up to the end of the age.

Leader: Hide your face from our sins and blot out all our iniquities. Create in us a clean heart and renew in us a right spirit, O Lord.


