Reflections on Today's Readings Matthew 6:19-34 & "Wellness Check" by poet Andrea Gibson

I don't know about you – but it's hard to not worry these days. There's so much that is stressful and fear-creating. And there seems to be so few solutions. I hear Jesus' words "to not worry about tomorrow" and my initial response is – "are you kidding?" "I can't stop worrying!"

Looking closer though – and remembering the context – we see that Jesus is saying something quite profound. He's not just saying "don't worry be happy" in a hallmarky-kind-of-way. Rather he's reminding those who listen to his words and commit to following in his Way –through repetenance and a change of direction towards the Kingdom of God – that God is sovereign. Just before this section Jesus invites us to pay attention to who we worship, not to who is noticing us and how we're seen when we pray and live our our faith. He reminds us that we are called to be in, but not of, the world. That we can't serve both the pursuit of wealth & things as a way to acquire meaning in life. Rather, meaning comes from knowing that we're loved by God – no matter what! And then loving others, and ourselves, in return. We're called to pay it forward, not navel gaze.

That's a radically different message than simply slapping our hands when we worry and fret. Jesus never says that worries about life are bad. What he's saying is to remember who God is; how God is. And to live rooted in that grace, love and clarifying certainty. Jesus invites us to be centered in love, not fear and the restless mind-ness it can create.

I think the poet Andrea Gibson is saying something similar in the poem "Wellness Check" which appears in the collection entitled *You Better Be Lightning*.

In any moment, on any given day, I can measure my wellness by this question:

Is my attention on loving, or is my attention on who isn't loving me?

QUESTIONS FOR REFLECTION & EXAMEN:

- What engaged, enraged, or surprised you in the text? Jesus preaches a radical integrity and wholeness in life centered in God's priorities. What are those priorities?
- How does what Andrea Gibson is saying in the poem about wellness in life interact with Jesus' *healthy living*?
- What invitation do you hear the Spirit of God speaking to you *or to us, as a church* to act, speak, be, or change?
