

Reflections on Today's Readings Luke 5:1-16

Our stories today have one major word in common. It's the word prostrate or falling down before someone. It's used to describe Peter's total-body reaction to Jesus' miraculous catch of fish and expression of his awe. It's use in the second story to describe the man identified with only his sickness, leprosy. This nameless man has become a stranger in his own land because of



his leprosy, He's cut off from his society by the purity laws, isolated from his community as someone unclean, thus unable to come to public gatherings for prayer and celebration. He's alienated from his own sense of self as he has become a person without a people. He falls down before Jesus in the hope and hunger of being healed and set free.

Traditionally we hear this first story (1-11) as one that talks about vocation and living our life for God. Jesus calls us to conversion: to new life with a new focus, yet it includes using our natural gifts. The fishermen are called to become fishers-of-men. It's a story that embodies that God uses us, needs us, involves us in collaboration and participation, not domination. Peter is Peter, yet through faith he discovers who God has always wanted him to become. That's why Jesus gives him a new name. Peter sees how much Jesus gets, how little he himself gets. He wants to reorient himself with this man in whom he tastes the goodness, vastness and grace of God.

The story of the man with leprosy (12-16) talks about empathy and grace. It paints a word picture of how God loves us, wants good for us, and will remake us as whole and healed and in doing so recreate our fractured communities. Yet I'm struck that the man who comes and falls at the feet of Jesus, maybe isn't just doing so out of desperation or as his last-chance-hope. Maybe he sees that Jesus is the only person who really sees him: as more than his disease, as more than an outcast to be avoided. Maybe his awe comes from being amazed to discover that he is worthy of love, relationship and wholeness. It's a story that paints a picture of more than just empathetic love. It reflects how God sees us as beloved. Just like the voice from the heavens has said about Jesus at his baptism in Luke 3:22.

Taken together they talk of how we are transformed by the way that we see God in the world, and when we glimpse how God sees us. The word holy means "that which is set apart," or "Aifferent than the ordinary." I think these stories tell us of how these two people experience the Holy in Jesus – in a way that they've been hungering for, in a way that reorients and redirects their life. I also think they convey how God makes us holy, or sees us as holy – worthy of God's love, blessing and grace – even when we can't see it ourselves.

QUESTIONS FOR REFLECTION & EXAMEN:

- What engaged, enraged, or surprised you in the text?
- How is Jesus bringing about the mission of freedom he declared as his purpose in Luke 3:18-19?
- What invitation do you hear the Spirit of God speaking to you or to us,– to act, speak, be, or change, through this scripture?
