This morning our worship service is structured using "The Cry of The Whole Congregation", a Palm/Passion Sunday Narrative Drama written by Walter Wangerin, Jr.

"The following drama takes place on the Sunday of the Passion. Its purpose is to allow us as worshipers suddenly to discover (pitifully, intensely, truly to discover) our own rootedness in the drama which is Christ's, so that the Passion Story may no longer be mere story for observance, analysis, learning or history; so that it embraces us, names us and becomes our own story indeed: the shape of our being.

Therefore, all senses are enlisted: sight, sound, the rhythm of both, music and motion, and the feel of each worshiper's voice in our throat and our emotions in our breasts. This drama has no audience. All are actors. None objective. All subjective, or else the objects of the driving love of God."

LISTENING FOR GOD'S WORD BY ENTERING INTO THE STORY 1. THE TRIUMPHAL ENTRY OF JESUS IN THE OCCUPIED CITY OF JERUSALEM

We enter into the story of the Passion on what we commonly call "Palm Sunday when Jesus entered or approached Jerusalem," (Luke 19:28) after having set his face towards the capital city (Luke 9:51). You can gather with Monte in the entry to begin the story.

Narrator: When he had come near Bethphage and Bethany, at the place called the Mount of Olives, he sent two of the disciples, saying, 'Go into the village opposite. There you will find tied a colt that has never been ridden. Untie it and bring it here. If anyone asks you, "Why are you untying it?" just say this: "The Lord needs it." So those who were sent, departed and found it as he had told them.


People: As they were untying the colt, its owners said to them "Why are you untying the colt?"

Peter: They said, "The Lord has need of it." Then they brought it to Jesus, and throwing their garments on the colt, they set Jesus upon it.

Narrator: As he rode along, the people spread their cloaks on the road. As he was drawing near, at the descent of the Mount of Olives, the whole multitude of the disciples began to rejoice and to praise God with aloud voice for all the deeds of power that they had seen.

Those who are gathered in the entryway will process in with palm branches into the sanctuary. You can place your branches along the red path towards the table, or hold them during the service. Together we'll sing verse 1 of "Hear, O Lord, my plea for Justice" Michael Morgan (1995, rev. 2010); Glory to God: the Presbyterian Hymnal #211

1. Hear, O Lord, my plea for justice; Listen to my heart-felt prayer. In your just deliberation may I find redemption there. (as you are processing, please find a place to sit and be seated)



Pharisee: Some of the Pharisees in the multitude cried to him, "Teacher, rebuke your disciples! They're calling you the Christ. Tell them to shut up!"

Narrator: He answered, "I tell you, if these were silent the very stones themselves would cry out"

Narrator: As he came near and saw the city, he wept over it, saying, "Would that even today you knew the things that make for peace! But now they are hid from your eyes. Indeed, the days will come upon you, when your enemies will set up a bank about you and hem you in on every side. They will dash you to the ground, you and your children within you, and they will not leave one stone upon another; because you did not recognize the time of your visitation from God.'

SONG OF RESPONSE: "It is Well With My Soul" or "When peace, like a river" Horatio Gates Spafford (1873)

1 When peace like a river attendeth my way, when sorrows like sea billows roll; whatever my lot, thou hast taught me to say, "It is well, it is well with my soul."

2. THE PREPARATION OF THE LAST SUPPER

Narrator: Now, the feast of Unleavened Bread drew near, which is called the Passover. The chief priests and the scribes were looking for a way to put Jesus to death, for they were afraid of the people.

Judas: Then Satan entered into Judas called Iscariot, who was one of the twelve; he went away and conferred with the chief priests and officers of the temple police about how he might betray him to them. They were greatly pleased and agreed to give him money. So he consented and began to look for an opportunity to betray him to them when no crowd was present.

Narrator: Then came the day of Unleavened Bread, on which the Passover lamb had to be sacrificed. So Jesus sent Peter and John, saying, 'Go and prepare the Passover meal for us that we may eat it.'

People: They asked him, 'Where do you want us to make preparations for it and what are we to do?"

Narrator: 'Listen,' he said to them, 'when you have entered the city, a man carrying a jar of water will meet you; follow him into the house he enters and say to the owner of the house, "The Teacher asks you, 'Where is the guest room, where I may eat the Passover with my disciples?" He will show you a large room upstairs, already furnished. Make preparations for us there.' So, they went and found everything as he had told them; and they prepared the Passover meal.

When the hour had come, he took his place at the table and the disciples with him. He said to them, "I have eagerly desired to eat this Passover with you before I suffer. For I tell you, I shall not eat it until it is fulfilled in the kingdom of God."

He took bread and when he had given thanks, he broke it and gave it to them, saying, "This is my body which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me."

Likewise, he then took a cup after supper, saying, "This cup which is poured out for you is the new covenant in my blood. I tell you that from now on I shall not drink of the fruit of the vine until the kingdom of God comes."

Narrator: Now behold the hand of him who betrays me is with meat the table. For the Son of Man goes as it has been determined; but woe to that man by whom he is betrayed!"

People: Then they began to question, "Who, Lord? Who is to betray you? Is it I? Is it I?"

Narrator: He answered, "He who has dipped his hand in the dish with me will betray me. Oh, it would have been better for that man if he had not been born."

Judas: Judas, who betrayed him, said, "Is it I, Master?"

Narrator: Jesus said to him, "You have said so." (A moment of silence as Judas walks away)

Peter: Simon Peter was indignant. "But not I!" he said. And he declared, "Though they all fall away from you,I will never leave you."

Narrator: "Peter, truly I say to you, this very night, before the cock crows, you will deny me three times."

Peter: Peter said to him, "Even if I must die with you, I will never deny you!"

People: And all of the disciples said the same, over and over again. 7

3. THE AGONY IN THE GARDEN

SONG OF RESPONSE: "Nothing Can Trouble"; Taizé Community

Nothing can trouble, nothing can frighten. Those who seek God shall never go wanting.

Nothing can trouble, nothing can frighten. God alone fills us.

Narrator: He came out and went, as was his custom, to the Mount of Olives; and the disciples followed him. When he came to the place he said to them, "Pray that you may not enter into temptation."

People: Lead us not into temptation, but deliver us, deliver us.

Narrator: Then he withdrew from them about a stone's throw, and knelt down and prayed, "Father, if thou art willing, remove this cup from me; nevertheless, not my will, but yours be done."

People: Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name. Your kingdom come; Your will be done. Your will be done.

Narrator: When he got up from prayer, he came to the disciples and found them sleeping, because of grief, and he said to them, "Why are you sleeping? Get up and pray that you may not enter into temptation."

People: Lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil, even the evil within ourselves.

Judas: While he was still speaking, there came a crowd, and the one called Judas, one of the twelve, was leading them. He drew near to Jesus to kiss Him.

Narrator: But Jesus said to him, "Judas, would you betray the Son of Man with a kiss?"

Judas: At once he came up to Jesus and said, 'Greetings, Rabbi!' and kissed him.

People: When the disciples saw what would follow, they said, "Lord, shall we strike with the sword?"

Peter: Then one of them struck the slave of the high priest and cut off his right ear.

Narrator: But Jesus said, "No more of this!" And he touched his ear and healed him.

People: Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us.

Narrator: Then Jesus said to the chief priests, the officers of the temple police, and the elders who had come for him, "Have you come out with swords and clubs as if I were a bandit? When I was with you day after day in the temple, you did not lay hands on me, But this is your hour and the power of darkness." Then they seized him.

4. THE JUDGMENT

SONG OF RESPONSE: "The Lord is My Light"; Taizé Community

The Lord is my light, My light and salvation: In God I trust, in God I trust.

Narrator: Then they seized Jesus and led him away, bringing him into the High Priest's house.

Peter: Peter followed at a distance. When they had kindled a fire in the middle of the courtyard and sat down together, Peter sat among them.

People: Then a maid, seeing him sitting in the firelight, stared at him and said, "This man also was with him."

Peter: But he denied it, saying, "Woman, I do not know him."

People: A little later someone else, on seeing him, said, 'You also are one of them.'

Peter: But Peter said, "Man, I am not."

People: An hour later another insisted, saying, "Surely this man also was with him; for he is a Galilean."

Peter: But Peter said, "Man, I do not know what you are saying!"

Narrator: At that moment, while he was still speaking, the cock crowed. And the Lord turned and looked at Peter.

Peter: Then Peter remembered the word of the Lord, how he had said to him, "Before the cock crows today, you will deny me three times." And he went out and he wept bitterly.

SONG OF RESPONSE: "The Lord is My Light"; Taizé Community

The Lord is my light, My light and salvation: In God I trust, in God I trust.



Narrator: Now the men who were holding Jesus mocked him and beat him; They also blindfolded him and kept asking him:

People: "Prophesy! Who is it that struck you?"

Narrator: They kept heaping many other insults on him and reviling him. When the day came, the assembly of the elders of the people, both chief priests and scribes, gathered together, and they brought him to their council.

People: They said, "If you are the Christ, tell us."

Narrator: He replied, "If I tell you, you will not believe; and if I question you, you will not answer. But from now on the Son of man shall be seated at the right hand of the power of God"

People: All of them asked, "Are you then the Son of God?"

Narrator: And he said to them, "You say that I am."

People: Then they said "Blasphemy! What further testimony do we need? We have heard it ourselves from his own lips. Blasphemy! Oh, blasphemy!"

5. DAWN FRIDAY: JESUS BEFORE PILATE

Narrator: Then the whole company of them arose, and brought Jesus before Pontius Pilate.

People: They began to curse him, saying, "We found this man perverting our nation, and forbidding us to pay taxes to Caesar, and saying that he himself is the Messiah, the King!"

Pilate: Then Pilate asked him, "Are you the King of the Jews? 12

Narrator: He answered him, "You say so."

Pilate: Then Pilate said to the Chief Priests and the multitudes, "I find no crime in this man."

People: But they were insistent, saying, "He stirs up the people by teaching throughout all Judea, from Galilee where he began even to this place."

Pilate: When Pilate heard that he was a Galilean, of Herod's jurisdiction, he sent him off to Herod.

Narrator: Where he was vehemently accused and treated with contempt, mocked, and clothed in an elegant robe; and then sent back again to Pilate.

Pilate: Pilate said to the rulers of the people, "You have brought me this man as one who was perverting the people; and here I have examined this man in your presence and have not found him guilty of any charges you've brought against him. Neither has Herod for he sent him back to us. Indeed, he has done nothing deserving death. I will therefore have him flogged and release him."

People: But they all cried out together, "Away with this man! Away! Away! Release to us Barabbas."

Narrator: Barabbas!--- a man who had been thrown into prison, for insurrection and for murder.

Pilate: Pilate, wanting to release Jesus, addressed them once more.

People: But they kept shouting, "Crucify him! Crucify him!"

Pilate: Why? What evil has he done? I've found no crime in him deserving death; I will therefore have him flogged and then release him.

People: But they were urgent, demanding with loud shouts that he should be crucified.

Narrator: And their voices prevailed.

Pilate: So, Pilate gave his verdict that their demand should be granted. He released the man they asked for, who had been put in prison for insurrection and murder, and handed Jesus over to their will.

6. FRIDAY MORNING: CRUCIFIXION

SONG OF RESPONSE: "Within Our Darkest Night"; Taizé Community

Within our darkest night, you kindle the fire that never dies away, never dies away.



Narrator: And he handed Jesus over to their will.


All Meas: As they led him away, they seized a man, Simon of Cyrene, who was coming in from the country, and laid the cross on him, and made him carry it behind Jesus. 14

All Women: A great number of the people followed him, and among them were women who were beating their breasts and wailing for him.

Jesus: But Jesus turned to them and said, "Daughters of Jerusalem, do not weep for me, but weep for yourselves and for your children. For behold, the days are coming when they will say, "Blessed are the barren, and the wombs that never bore, and the breasts that never nursed." Then they will begin to say to the mountains, "Fall on us"; and to the hills, "Cover us." For if they do this when the wood is green, what will happen when it is dry?" (pause)

Narrator: Two others also, who were criminals, were led away to be put to deathwith him. When they came to the place, which is called the Skull, there they crucified Jesus there with the criminals, one on his right and one onhisleft.

SONG OF RESPONSE: "Hear, O Lord, my plea for Justice" verse 1



Narrator: Then Jesus said, "Father, forgive them; for they know not what they do."

All Women: Forgive us our trespasses.

And they cast lots to divide his garments.

All Women: Forgive us our trespasses.



AND Mem: And the people stood by, watching. But the leaders scoffed at him, saying, "He saved others; let him save himself, if he is the Messiah of God, his chosen one!

All Women: Forgive us our trespasses.

All Men: The soldiers also mocked him, coming up and offering him sour wine, and saying, 'If you are the King of the Jews, save yourself!'.

All Women: There was an inscription over him: 'This is the king of the Jews."

All Ment Forgive us our trespasses. Forgive us, O Lord, our trespasses!

Judas: One of the criminals who was hanged with him railed at him, saying, "Are you not the Messiah? Save yourself and us!"

Peter: But the other rebuked him saying, "Do you not fear God, since we are under the same sentence of condemnation? And we have been condemned justly, for we are getting what we deserve for our deeds, but this man has done nothing wrong.' Then he said, 'Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom.'

People: Forgive us our trespasses. Deliver us from evil for Thine is the kingdom.

Narrator: And Jesus replied

People: And the power-

Narrator: "Truly, truly, I say to you"

People: And the glory -

Narrator: Today, you will be with me in Paradise."

People: Forever and ever. Amen!

SONG OF RESPONSE: "Hear, O Lord, my plea for Justice" verse 2

Narrator: It was now about noon—and darkness came over the whole land until three in the afternoon, while the sun's light failed and the curtain of the temple was torn in two, from the top to the bottom. Then Jesus, crying with a loud, voice, said, "Father, into your hands I commend my spirit!"

(Silence)

And having said this, he breathed his last.

(Pause)

All the crowds had gathered there for this spectacle

People: And when they saw what had taken place, they returned home beating their breasts. 17

All Women: But all his acquaintances, including the women who had followed him from Galilee, stood at a distance, watching these things.

7. LATE FRIDAY AFTERNOON: BURIAL

SONG OF RESPONSE: "Hear, O Lord, my plea for Justice" verse 3

Pilate: Now there was a good and righteous man named Joseph, who, though a member of the council, had not agreed to their plan and action. He came from the Jewish town of Arimathea, he was waiting expectantly for the kingdom of God. This man went to Pilate and asked for the body of Jesus. Then he took it down, wrapped it in a linen cloth, and laid it in a rock-hewn tomb where no one had ever been laid.

Narrator: It was the day of Preparation, and the Sabbath was beginning.

All Women: The women who had come with him from Galilee followed, and they saw the tomb and how his body was laid. Then they returned and prepared spices and ointments-

Narrator: On the Sabbath they rested according to the commandment.


