Thoughts on Psalm 49 & Luke 12:13-21

"You can't take it with you." This seemingly timeless warning against materialism that alludes to the fact that you can't keep your money or possessions when you die is at the root of today's scripture. The expression dates from an early 19th century book by Frederick Marr (1841) and gained even wider use when George Kaufman and Moss Hart used it as the title for one of their



great comedies on Broadway (1937) - later made into a successful movie. (*Wikipedia*).

A 2010 study by Daniel Kahneman and Angus Deaton at Princeton's Center for Health and Well-being, showed that income had a positive effect on both people's emotional well-being and their life evaluation. This isn't really surprising given that we tend to assume that poverty is likely to exacerbate the struggles of life and therefore lead to greater rates of unhappiness. Yet, it feels crass, maybe even un-Christian to make the inverse claim that more money will necessarily lead to greater happiness.

Today's Psalm is a form of *Wisdom Literature*, seemingly more like a proverb than a classic psalm. The wisdom, or spiritual advice of psalm 49 is pretty straightforward. It can be summed up in classic sayings of: "You can't take it with you!" and "you cannot use your money to buy your way out of death." We are all laid bare before the stunning verdict of death that unites us all as mortals (v 12).

The psalm also seems to have a differentiated audience: some who hear it are rich, some poor. Therefore, the psalm can have a different impact depending on one's sense of his or her wealth. The poor are afraid and don't need to be. The rich don't appear to be afraid but ought to be. The message for the poor is that they ought not to fear troubles brought on by the sins of the rich and powerful (verses 5-6, 16). The message for the rich is that no amount of wealth can ransom them from death (verses 7-9, 16-17).

In the reading from Luke 12, Jesus says the same existential truth in the telling of a parable. No matter how many treasures, whatever they may be, that you store up, you can't take them with you, and they can't save your life. Both readings reassure the poor and oppressed that God will see to everyone's ultimate fate. But we must should be cautious about assuming that modern America Christians easily match up with the poor and lowly of Psalm 49. For the painful reality of global economics reveals that even moderate-income folks in the West have incredible wealth compared to 99% of the world's population.

QUESTIONS FOR THE PRACTICE OF EXAMEN & CONTEMPLATION

- What word, phrase or image grabs your attention?
- What is the psalmist saying about wealth and poverty, about happiness and satisfaction?
- How do the word of this story touch your life and our life as the church today?

One: What is your only comfort in life and death?

ALL: That I am not my own, but belong with body and soul, both in life and in death, to my faithful Saviour Jesus Christ.

Christ has fully paid for all my sins with his precious blood, and has set me free from all the power of the devil.

Jesus also preserves me in such a way that without the will of my heavenly Father not a hair can fall from my head; indeed, all things must work together for my salvation.

Therefore, by his Holy Spirit he also assures me of eternal life and makes me heartily willing and ready from now on to live for him.
