In the season of a pandemic new normal, you're invited to pass the peace of God however and to whoever you can this day as we live our lives of disciples of Jesus sheltering-in-place, as a living sign of the Dominion of God at work moving us toward the healing transformation of the world.

POSTLUDE "Christmastime Is Here"

Reflections on Today's Readings John 1:1-18

We're diving into the Gospel of John as our guiding text for our Sunday gatherings from now through Easter. It's one of the four stories of the good news of Jesus (Gospel means good news) which tells his life, actions, words and mission. It's believed



that John's account is the last one written as his retelling of the story reflects considerable theological reflection and uses metaphors and poetic language. One example is the play with light and darkness throughout the story. John's account also contains only seven miracles - or signs as they're called. A symbolic number in Jewish tradition that represents the divine.

Today we read the beginning of the gospel, which quotes and plays with the beginning of the Bible - what we call Genesis - which itself begins with "in the beginning...." Rather than telling the story of Jesus' birth (what we call the Christmas story today), John is situating Jesus at the beginning of time and creation. It's a story of God creating through speech, the sharing of a Word. Creation is rooted in from conversation, in a sense it springs forth as a response to God's initial word. In this line of thought, life is dialogue, we are invited to speak and be heard by the God of the universe - inviting us to a conversation with God and with each other in which we participate as mutual subjects, equal children and full participants.

John also takes into consideration the Greek (or Pagan) culture in which he writes the gospel as a testimony to who Jesus was and is and will become. The Roman Empire of this time was cemented in Greek thought, in particular Greek Philosophy (think of Socrates, Plato and Aristotle – who continue to deeply shape our world and way of thinking about it). The Greek philosopher Heraclitus appears to be the first to have used the word logos (Word) to refer to a rational divine intelligence, which today is sometimes referred to in scientific discourse as the "mind of God." *Logos* is a universal divine reason, immanent in nature, yet transcending all oppositions and imperfections in the cosmos and humanity. It's an eternal and unchanging truth present from the time of creation, available to every individual who seeks it. A unifying and liberating revelatory force which reconciles the human with the divine. It connects creation to God, us to God and us to creation. It's spiritual but also rational, touching all aspects of life as a primary foundation - like a secret sauce.

QUESTIONS FOR REFLECTION & EXAMEN:

- What engaged you, enraged you, or surprised you in the text?
- When and how have you experienced God, as experienced more personally in Jesus the Christ, as the force, word, reason, light that holds things together in your life and gives, comfort, direction and purpose? Or when and how have you felt "found" by God in your
- What invitation do you hear the Spirit of God speaking to you or to us, as a church - to act, speak, be or change through this word of scripture?
