## Reflections on Today's Readings John 8:31-50; John 14:1-14

One of the most famous lines of poetry of which you've maybe never heard is that "The Earth is blue like an orange." Written by French Surrealist Paul Éluard, it provokes our imagination and challenges our understanding of the world. This week we turn to the fourth of what we as Presbyterians we call the Six Great Ends of the Church. *The Preservation of the Truth.* Book of Order (F-1.0304),

Truth. What a loaded word for us today! Everyone claims to have it, to speak for it, to be defending it and yet it can be nearly impossible at times to understand it, or understand others who claim to speak the truth when they so obviously don't. We have new words to define the wide spectrum between truth and untruth: fake news, misinformation, disinformation, truthiness, and alternative facts. Is truth what we can conclude from observing facts? Is truth however we choose to interpret the world (versus them and how they do it)? Is truth in the eye of the beholder? Is truth something that's out there, that is a undeniable reality? Is truth about objective observation or relational connection?

How can the Church preserve the truth in the world – and our society – when we struggle to even define what true is?

Our two scripture passages today are some of the most famous in the Bible about truth. In John 8 Jesus, debating with the established religious leaders about faith and community identity, says that when you know the truth it will set you free. But from what? Lies? Ignorance? Or is Jesus talking more about relational and communal identity than observable facts? He's infuriatingly both clear and completely unclear?

In John 14 we drop into the middle of a long intimate discussion between Jesus and his closest friends (disciples). They're sharing the Passover Meal, the ritualistic retelling of how God delivered the ancient Israelites from slavery under Pharaoh in Egypt to freedom with God in the Promised Land. Jesus summarizes his teachings, and pushes his disciples even farther. Confused Thomas speaks up and asks for more clarity. Again Jesus gives an answer that is both majestically clear and irritatingly vague. They don't know what's going to happen. They want clarity, maybe a detailed step-by-step plan of what is to come and Jesus explains by saying Don't worry. I am the Way, the Truth and the Life. What? Is Jesus the only one who speaks truth? Or is he talking a bit like the poetry of Paul Éluard?

### **OUESTIONS FOR REFLECTION & EXAMEN:**

- What engaged you, enraged you, or surprised you in the text?
- How do you define what's true? Where do you go to find it?
- What do you hear in theses passages as your, or our, call to preserve the truth as the Church? What's that look like?
