Reflections on Today's Readings Luke 1:39-58

Today's text makes clear how the stories of Elizabeth and her cousin Mary are interconnected. As they encounter each other it's as if the earth trembles and the clouds part, making clear what God is up to in the world. They spend months together as the babies in their wombs mature and their hope gestates in conversation and shared prayer.



Luke has Mary proclaim her "Magnificat" – or song of faith inspired and shaped by Hebrew women who sang of God bringing down rulers from their thrones and humbles lords of this world such as Deborah, Judith, Miriam, and Hannah. Mary's song is a passionate, proud, and powerful proclamation of the revolutionary God who loves her; the One who lifts up those deemed small and unimportant in the eyes of the world; who glorifies the disenfranchised facing shame, gossip. In the first half of the song (v.46-49) Mary reflects on what God has done for her. The second (v.50-55) is what God has done throughout history. Mary has learned from scripture, from the stories of those who came before and served God. She was ready and able to experience it herself, to enter into God's will for the world.



Theologians have long saw in Mary the reversal of Eve, who in the story of Genesis 2-3 exalts herself, grasping at equality with God by eating from the forbidden tree. Mary is poor in spirit, robed in humility and "being obedient she became the cause of salvation for herself and for the whole human race" (Irenaeus 130-202 AD)

Mary knows that the strength of God is shown to those who are faithful to God's word. And so, she entrusts herself to God despite the fear of rejection, gossip, shame, and despair that she faces. She waits in her humble state, for God to act. In this way she becomes and is known as the *Theotokos* ($\Theta \epsilon o t \acute{o} \kappa o \varsigma$) translated as "Mother of God" or "God-bearer". She makes God and God's way of peace visible to others through her humble obedience that refuses to envision faith as a spectator sport. She bears God to us.
