

In the season of a pandemic new normal, you're invited to pass the peace of God however and to whoever you can this day as we live our lives of disciples of Jesus sheltering-in-place, as a living sign of the Dominion of God at work moving us toward the healing transformation of the world.

POSTLUDE "That's Life"

Reflections on Today's Readings John 11:1-44

Today's story is unique to the gospel of John. It also holds a unique place in the way that John tells the story of Jesus. For we're told in John 11:45-53 – that it's because of the resurrection healing of Lazarus that the religious leaders ultimately decide to seek the death of Jesus in order to silence him.

John began the gospel with a retelling of the Genesis story of creation as a creative conversation between God and the *Logos*: the eternal word or essence from which all was made according to Greek Philosophy which was the dominant world-view at this time. This "story of the creative conversation in the word and person of Jesus is structured around 7 signs – the word that John uses for miracle. They continue the word of God in Genesis during the seven days of Creation. It would be difficult to tell these stories without conveying some sense of wonder that we're being let in on something extraordinary, a realization that these signs are evidence that God is still at work in creation and isn't just its Maintenance Engineer." (Eugene Peterson)

The miracles, or signs, inspire some to faith and wondering, incite others to anger and hate. "All Jesus' miracles are signs of what he is and what he has come to give humanity, but in none of them does the sign more closely approach the reality than in the gift of life. The physical life that Jesus gives to Lazarus is still not in the realm of the life from above, but it is so close to that realm that it may be said to conclude the ministry of signs and inaugurate the ministry of glory. (These are the two sub-books that make up John according to the dominant hermeneutical theories. The book of Signs ends with today's passage, which opens then on the Book of glory in Chapter 12)." – Raymond E. Brown, The Gospel of John Vol. 1.

Jesus' giving of life is what leads to his death. Maybe it's the cost for the life that he gives?; a life abundant that the world cannot give, nor understand. Lazarus, once back to life from the dead, was he afraid of death or threats of death by his adversaries? Was he unbound to a new form of life, a new dynamic of freedom, truth-telling, mercy-giving, service-of-others-doing?

Today's sign summarizes everything about Jesus. He's moved by great love – intense emotion – at the news of the death of his friend. He struggles, labors, and intercedes for his life. And Lazarus is delivered from what the psalmists poetically call the snares of death. The ultimate enemy is overcome, bankrupted, defeated. What does life look like in such freedom?

QUESTIONS FOR REFLECTION & EXAMEN:

- What engaged you, enraged you, or surprised you in the text?
- What is the miraculous sign in this story?
- How does this story, or this sign, speak to our life and world today?
- What invitation do you hear the Spirit of God speaking to you or to us, as a church – to act, speak, be or change through this word of scripture?

PREFACE TO A BRIEF STATEMENT OF FAITH PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH (U.S.A.)

In 1983 the two largest Presbyterian churches in the United States reunited. *The Plan for Reunion* called for the preparation of a brief statement of the Reformed faith for possible inclusion in the *Book of Confessions*. This statement is therefore not intended to stand alone, apart from the other confessions of our church. It does not pretend to be a complete list of all our beliefs, nor does it explain any of them in detail. It is designed to be confessed by the whole congregation in the setting of public worship, and it may also serve pastors and teachers as an aid to Christian instruction. It celebrates our rediscovery that for all our undoubted diversity, we are bound together by a common faith and a common task.

The faith we confess unites us with the one, universal church. The most important beliefs of Presbyterians are those we share with other Christians, and especially with other evangelical Christians who look to the Protestant Reformation as a renewal of the gospel of Jesus Christ. Diversity remains. But we are thankful that in our time the many churches are learning to accept, and even to affirm, diversity without divisiveness, since the whole counsel of God is more than the wisdom of any individual or any one tradition. The Spirit of Truth gives new light to the churches when they are willing to become pupils together of the Word of God. This statement therefore intends to confess the catholic faith.

No confession of faith looks merely to the past; every confession seeks to cast the light of a priceless heritage on the needs of the present moment, and so to shape the future. Reformed confessions, in particular, when necessary even reform the tradition itself in the light of the Word of God. From the first, the Reformed churches have insisted that the renewal of the church must become visible in the transformation of human lives and societies. Hence "A Brief Statement of Faith" lifts up concerns that call most urgently for the church's attention in our time. The church is not a refuge from the world; an elect people is chosen for the blessing of the nations. A sound confession, therefore, proves itself as it nurtures commitment to the church's mission, and as the confessing church itself becomes the body by which Christ continues the blessing of his earthly ministry.

THE BRIEF STATEMENT OF FAITH
