Reflections on Today's Readings Deuteronomy 5:12-15 & Matthew 5:1-12

Our readings today reflect the foundational culture of the Church – of those who seek to follow in the Way of God to which Jesus points. Our reading of the seventh commandment in Deuteronomy is a reminder that God is about the business of liberation in view of being whole and holy. The sabbath day of rest, reflection and worship was intended to be a practice to remind people of their freedom, and to mature their ethical understanding of what it meant for them to be free and to promote freedom among other people.

The Beatitudes, told in Matthew 5, begin the Sermon on the Mount which continues through Matthew 7. In this dense yet simple vision Jesus lays out the way in which God sees the world, the way that Jesus experienced the world through his dependence upon God. Even more it's an invitation for those who follow the Way of Jesus to awaken, to see the world as God created it to be. Ironically, or even tragically, as Father John Dear observes, "Churches have dismissed the Beatitudes and the sermon on the Mont – the most important teachings of Jesus – as sweet poetry that need not be followed. Instead, we have upheld every empire, blessed every way, led every crusade, supported slavery, burned people at the stake, worn the robes of the KKK, built nuclear weapons, manned the Pentagon, and supported virtually every injustice on record. Todav. it's Christians who build and maintain nuclear weapons and threaten to use them at a moment's notice to vaporize millions of people. It's Christians who lead us deeper into the catastrophe of collimate change instead of mainstreaming alternative to fossil fuels. We might be devout, we might claim to love Jesus as our personal savior, we might even get indignant over those who do not believe in a virtuous life - yet we go right on serving the empire and the culture of violence. As we compartmentalize our spirituality, we go on supporting the world's killings, oppressions, and economic and military domination over billions of sisters and brothers around the world, not to mention the creatures of the earth and the earth itself. I wonder if Christians even know the Beatitudes and the Sermon on the Mount, for that Jesus was nonviolent and forbade violence." John Dear, The Beatitudes of Peace.

QUESTIONS FOR REFLECTION & EXAMEN:

- What engaged, enraged, or surprised you in these texts?
- Freedom is at the foundation of Judeo-Christian faith and also American culture. How do you understand freedom? *From what* are you free? *For what* are you free?
- How is it possible to live by the Beatitudes?
- What invitation do you hear the Spirit of God speaking to you or to us, as a church to act, speak, be or change through this word of scripture?
