# Reflections on Today's Readings Mark 5:21-43

Today we're starting a month long series on mental health. May is national Mental Health Awareness Month. As we've spoken of in the past weeks we're facing what the surgeon general calls an epidemic of loneliness. It's highly intertwined with the dramatic increase in anxiety, depression and stress-related trauma that many Americans are identifying since the COVID-19 pandemic began.

We turn to the Bible looking for wisdoms from the ancient stories and sacred texts. But we often don't think the Bible has much to say about modern things like PTSD, anxiety, depression, AI or climate change. But it does! Moses suffered from anxiety over his speech impediment. Peter was probably plagued by PTSD or stress-related trauma after stabbing his teacher in the back. In today's scripture we see a woman ostracized for her physical condition, for which she can do



nothing. She probably was clinically depressed and traumatized by relational rejection and abandonment issues. And Jairus - who should have everything going for him according to human nature, doesn't.

There is no cure to being human even if you're wealthy, well known and respected or have power.

There are several words for healing in the Greek language, in which the gospel of Mark is written. One of them is the word *therapeo*. Sound familiar? It's the word from which we get our word therapy. *Therapeo* means to be healed, but also to be liberated, freed and saved. Jesus not only heals the bleeding woman physically but also restores her to her place in society by recognizing her as a full human being, an important part of society, a daughter of his family! Her healing-therapy-salvation wasn't just a one day thing...it probably continued for years. How could it not if she'd been suffering from poverty, isolation, communal rejection, and family abandonment for 12 years!

We are surrounded by people like the bleeding woman and Jairus. We are those people. What good word does God have for us? How might be embody God's love to those in need?

### **QUESTIONS FOR REFLECTION & EXAMEN:**

- What engaged, enraged, or surprised you in these texts?
- Imagine yourself as someone in the story a disciple, the bleeding woman, Jairus, a member of the crowd. Reread the story. How do you respond, or feel about what transpires?
- These two stories of healing are sandwiched one inside the other. What do they reveal about sickness, being healed, (made well or whole)? How does Jesus long to make both women well? What does that look like?
- What invitation do you hear the Spirit of God speaking to you – or to us, as a church – to act, speak, be, or change, through this word of scripture?
