PASSING THE PEACE OF GOD

In the season of COVID-19 you're invited to pass the peace of God however and to whoever you can this day as we live our lives of disciples of Jesus sheltering-in-place, as a living sign of the Dominion of God at work moving us toward the healing transformation of the world.

Reading for the Third Sunday of Advent Isaiah 60:1-6; Ephesians 3:1-12 & Matthew 2:1-12

Our readings today are all suggested by the Lectionary. The three-year cycle by which many churches around the world read through the Bible for Sunday gatherings. Matthew 2 tells the story of the coming of the Magi to recognize and pay respect to the Christ Child. We're told that their journey from afar (probably ancient Persia [today's Iran]) began in glimpsing the rare astrological phenomenon in the skies. The Greek word [magos] or mage used to describe them is related to our word magician. But they were more likely what we call today scientists. The "magic" they practiced included astronomy, astrology, alchemy and other forms of esoteric knowledge. They studied the world in order to better understand what was and was coming.

The selection from Isaiah is a prophecy about a future revelation. Soaring poetry, it speaks of foreigners who will have the wisdom to recognize the way in which the way of the Most High God is revealed in the story of the Israelites. What's easy to forget is that Isaiah speaks this lyrical word of hope and universal recognition in a time of oppression, when the Israelites were at the mercy of the Babylonian and Persian Empires, when the Israelites most likely didn't see their vocation as one of spiritual counselors or testimonies to foreigners, but rather dreamed of taking revenge on their foreign oppressors.

In the Apostle Paul's letter to the Ephesians, he writes of the mystery of what God is up to – that God, known in the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus – is about reconciliation, bringing together diverse and disparate peoples: Jew and Gentile. Historically religion was tied to ethnicity. You had the same faith as your people. Here though Paul argues that Jesus breaks down the barriers that construct everything in terms of black and white, us versus them to reveal the gospel intention of God for all peoples.

QUESTIONS FOR EXAMEN

- 1. What image or word in the scriptures grabs you?
- 2. The three scriptures speak of knowledge that is revealed or suddenly understood. That's what the word Epiphany means. In your own life what epiphanies have you had?
- 3. Looking at the events, darkness and clarity of the past year, where have you glimpsed epiphanies?; God at work, revealing, expanding understanding, inviting participation?
- 4. Talk with God about what you see or don't see.
