

In the season of COVID-19 you're invited to pass the peace of God however and to whoever you can this day as we live our lives of disciples of Jesus sheltering-in-place, as a living sign of the Dominion of God at work moving us toward the healing transformation of the world.

Reflections on Today's Reading John 4:1-42

Our theme this Lent is Flourishing. Lent and Easter coincide with Spring, and the renewal of nature as the winter ebbs. Have you noticed this week the burst of growth, change and color around us? I'm struck by how plants are budding and pushing through cracks and lines in the pavement. They're easy to miss until they're not. They're a organic metaphor for the social changes, racial reckoning and institutional flailing that dominant the moment we're in. The roots of our challenges, injustice, and misunderstandings have long been there (like seeds or seedlings invisible in the sidewalk cracks) and now they're inescapable. How did we not see -or even "notice" them- before?

Something that flourishes grows or develops in a healthy or vigorous way, especially as the result of a particularly favorable environment. We see to be in a time in which such vigorous growth in our perspectives, social cohesion, racial reconciliation and moral justice is potentially more favorable than it has been. That's in part what the rallying cry of "Black Lives Matter" points to – a reality that is evident and yet goes against the grain in the lived-out-practice of our society. Our constitution says that "all men are created equal.". Yet when we read between the lines and against the grain we recognize that it doesn't mention women and it also defines anyone who is not white or a land-owner as a 3/5ths person. This technique of reading texts against the grain and between the lines, of cataloging their omissions and laying bare their contradictions, is called the "hermeneutics of suspicion."

As you read today's scripture in John when is said in the silence between the lines? What goes against the grain of the text: both this story and the larger story and teachings of Jesus? In John's telling of the good news story of Jesus, this woman is the first "evangelist" who tells others about her miraculous encounter with Jesus like the hearing of a Word that makes all things new. She also is contrasted with the story of Nicodemus (in chapter 3) – he is man, a leader of the Jewish people and faith. Here this woman is a Samaritan, seemingly despised and unwanted by all – and yet she is the one who responds by following Jesus.

QUESTIONS FOR MEDITATION & EXAMEN:

- 1. What engaged you, enraged you, or surprised you in the text? a word, image, or phrase?
- 2. What is unique about this interaction between Jesus and the un-named woman? How is she identified?
- 3. Who needs redemption and healing deliverance (a flourishing that only God can give) in this story?
- 4. What has to be "let go of" to embrace this vigorous spiritual growth that Jesus talks of as living water?
- 5. How is the Spirit of God inviting you to *flourishing* faith through this text?

"The Water God Gives Us"


