PASSING THE PEACE OF GOD

In the season of COVID-19 you're invited to pass the peace of God however and to whoever you can this day as we live our lives of disciples of Jesus sheltering-in-place, as a living sign of the Dominion of God at work moving us toward the healing transformation of the world.

Reflections on the Today's Readings Psalm 86:15; Proverbs 14:29-15:2; Numbers 20:1-13; John 2:13-22

We continue our series on Ujima – Swahili for the collective work of the people. While Ujima in the context of Kwanzaa refers specifically to the work of the African-American people to reclaim and maintain their culture, we can also take the notion of Ujima and use it to ask ourselves what our continuing work as the people of God is today – as we move into 2021.

We've talked about truth, and how it's connected to reconciliation, which isn't possible without forgiveness. We've also talked about the curious call of God to love our neighbor, not necessarily like them. Today we talk about anger.

The word for anger in biblical Hebrew is *aph*. It's a good example of the curious nature of the Hebrew Language. *Aph* is also the Hebrew word for a "nose," or "nostrils" (*plural*). When one becomes very angry, the nostrils start flaring. Anger (like most emotions) is visceral and felt in our bodies even if we tend to deny it.

A oft used refrain in the Bible testimonies is repeated in Psalm 86:15. "But you, O Lord, are kind and gracious, slow to anger (to flair your nostrils) and your love can always be trusted."

And yet often the Bible talks of judgment and justice as the pouring out of God's wrath, like the pouring of wine from a cup. The Hebrew word for wrath is חַבֶּה pronounced "chemah." It means wrath, fury, indignation, anger. It's related to heat, rage, venom, poison, coming from the ancient Semitic expression that describes your foot when it becomes chafed after walking barefoot in the desert.

And so often in the Bible we hear of anger, the heat that swells up our nostrils with rage and emotion. We also hear of wrath that is like the heat and venomous sores that build up on your barefoot over time as you encounter rough, unplanned for terrain.

In the Bible we hear of God's anger with humanity. With hear in the psalms of Lament of anger with God's seeming absence and inaction. We see in Numbers 20 Moses losing his cool in anger with his fellow citizens and losing control of his actions. Then in John 2 we hear of Jesus who blows his lid when he sees injustice in the temple and without losing controls drives everyone out. Ans do anger seems to be both a positive and destructive force.

A word from John Bell on the song he wrote "If the War Goes On"

"Somewhere in the middle of the 20th century, Western Christians lost the ability to lament. It may be attributed to a false sense of security and self-righteousness during the Cold War; it may have been the corrosive acid of easy theology which proclaimed that God could only deal with the positives and that if bad things happened it was the result of undischarged guilt. What happened to the just anger and cries of protest that inhabited Dylan and Baez in the sixties and that fueled the fervor of the civil rights movement? How sad that the late 20th and early 21st century Anglo-American incursions into the Gulf and hyper-cautiousness regarding the Israel-Palestine conflict should find no response in the Church's song."
