In the season of COVID-19 you're invited to pass the peace of God however and to whoever you can this day as we live our lives of disciples of Jesus sheltering-in-place, as an living sign of the Dominion of God at work moving us toward the healing transformation of the world.

## Thoughts on Matthew 24:3 & 25: [1, 14] 31-46

This week has felt like the end of the world even more than usual. The smoke and orange skies have piled onto the other events and calamities remind us each day that the world as we have known it has changed, or maybe even ended. Like many people today, the ancient Israelites also believed in the impending end of the world - but it was different. They spoke of the end of the age, and of the Day of the Lord - a moment in time when creation would be completed, when justice would overwhelm injustice in the world, when the wrongs would be righted, when the broken made whole, those without a home would be welcomed home like the prodigal son and those who hungered (physically and spiritually) would feast at a table presided over by God (Isaiah 2 & 25; Micah 4). It was less the end of the world in a fiery ball that we imagine these days than the birth-pangs and transformation of God finishing the world begun in creation, in the ultimate realization, and redemption of the created order.

This is the topic that the disciples ask Jesus about beginning in Mathew 24:3...continuing through the end of chapter 25, and our text today about the sheep and goats. In the parable Jesus speaks of the "Son of Man" a prophetic title often used by the ancient Israelites to speak of the Messiah to come, who would make all things news, first mentioned in a vision in the book of Daniel. The parable is fairly clear, in particular if you're accustomed to shepherding. The flock is composed of sheep and goats. Not too difficult to differentiate between and separate.

Looking closer we can wonder if it's just a similar morality story. Is it making sandwiches for the hungry, or fighting the mismanagement and greed of the elite landowners (the 1%) of that day that controlled the economy, often while living abroad? Is welcoming strangers as simple as being kind to those you meet in the marketplace, or is more about taboo-breaking love of those who don't fit in, the foreign – by birth or marginalization? Caring for the sick is the compassionate thing to do, but what if it costs you something – what if the sick you care for are contagious – like we see with COVID-19, or as the ancients believed that those who were sick were "unclean" – tainted spiritually which could then be transmitted? It would seem that Jesus talks both about concrete practical actions and systemic change and solidarity.

Looking deeper 'the shock of this parables is that no one – not the goats and not even the sheep – recognized Christ because they assumed that the majestic, triumphant Lord of all time would surely appear as a powerful presence in history. But that is not God's way in the world. 'He has no form or majesty that we should look at him... He was despised and rejected by others; a man of suffering and acquainted with infirmity.'" (Isaiah 53:2-3).

- How do you experience loving others as loving Christ?
- What word of hope, grace and/or exhortation do you hear in this parable?

- <sup>3</sup>Sitting on Mount Olives, Jesus spoke with his disciples answering their questions about the end of the Age by telling several parables...
- <sup>1</sup> "God's kingdom is like ten young virgins who took oil lamps and went out to greet the bridegroom.
- <sup>14</sup> "God's kingdom is also like a man going off on an extended trip. He called his servants together and delegated responsibilities.
- <sup>31-33</sup> "When he finally arrives, blazing in beauty and all his angels with him, the Son of Man will take his place on his glorious throne. Then all the nations will be arranged before him and he will sort the people out, much as a shepherd sorts out sheep and goats, putting sheep to his right and goats to his left.
