Thoughts on Today's Scripture Romans 8:18-39



NOTHING CAN SEPARATE US FROM THE LOVE OF GOD. ROMANS 8:35

The pastoral letter we call Romans is the chef d'oeuvre of the work of the apostle Paul. This note to the church in ancient Rome is a soaring piece of literature and hymnic poetry that deals with the deepest theological and ethical questions that we still face ourselves today. They include: How do we come to faith in Christ? Does it matter what religious, or non-religious, background from which we start that journey? How is it that the life and death of Jesus changes, shapes and redeems my life?; our life?; our world? How can this belief in the good news of Jesus as good news for the whole world be true when bad things happen to both good and bad people?

Romans 8 is one of the climactic moments in the rhetorical argument of Paul in why we should embrace, endure and hope in the love of God made visible in the life of Christ Jesus. At the onset of the letter Paul articulates succinctly his conviction:

"For I am not ashamed of the gospel; it is the power of God for salvation to everyone who has faith, to the Jew first and also to the Greek. For in it the righteousness of God is revealed through faith for faith; as it is written, 'The one who is righteous will live by faith.'" – Romans 1:16-17

Here, Paul concludes that idea, rooted in a hope in and for the future. The word "hope" (or "eager longing" in the NRSV translation) in 8:19 is more than a positive thought. The Greek word comes from the idea of straining one's neck forward to see what is coming next.

Paul writes about faith as a long race, endurance as the food we must turn towards, communal encouragement as the well we must drink from, and a radical-bigger-than-you-could-everimagine love of God in which we must root our trust and belief. Hardship, horror and loss are part of life from which we do not escape in faith. And our ultimate destination, the purpose of all that God has done, is doing, and will do – is our redemption. Not an individual redemption but one that connects me to you and you to me, and all of us both to each other and to all of creation. The English word "redemption" means 'repurchase' or 'buy back'. But Paul is talking about a state of being that is deeply intertwined with notions of freedom, actualization, harmony, vibrant peace, and God's universal will. We can hope for it because the Spirit of God moves within our prayers, giving us a glimpse, or foretaste, of this incontrovertible purpose of God that nothing – not even the evils faced by Christ – can impede.

Recognizing that this text arose from the years of apartheid in South Africa adds depth and resonance to its already confident language. Yet these words can also be read as a summary of Christ's death and resurrection, the true basis of our hope that good will triumph over evil.
